Ever since our ministry originated, our founder Deborah Smith would say, "We are bringing hope to the families and children by distributing gifts at Christmastime." I only thought of the unspoken expectations of little ones who believed in Santa Claus; little did I realize there's more to bringing hope than dropping off brightly colored packages on the doorstep.

Hope, according to scripture, is the not-yet manifested object of desire. Faith, on the other hand, is the evidence of things not seen.
